<u>Catalog description</u>: Continued development of students' communicative competency in Vietnamese with a focus on listening, speaking, reading, writing, and culture at the intermediate level. Emphasis on building vocabulary and developing grammatical accuracy. Conducted primarily in Vietnamese.

- 2. develop critical thinking and analytical skills, moral sensibilities and informed sympathy for other people's lives and experiences
- analyze historical and cultural factors that have contributed to the development of Vietnamese-speaking communities and shaped their social practices and cultural values in present times
- 4. demonstrate awareness of cultural diversity
- 5. identify and analyze dilemmas, ambiguity, tensions, and conflicts that face Vietnamese people in their daily lives
- 6. acquire an understanding of what it means to be human: struggles and aspirations, achievements and failures, and values and visions
- demonstrate their listening and reading competence at the level of Intermediate-High on the ACTFL Guidelines (American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages) and speaking and writing at the level of Intermediate-Mid/Intermediate-High.

b. Required Course Assignments:

• Attendance and participation (5%)

Active engagement with course materials and timely submission of all assignments constitutes evidence of class attendance and participation. You are required to log on to Canvas weekly and review the week's course materials to demonstrate your course participation. Assignments and homework are due each week and attendance will be taken based on your submitting assignments weekly. If you fail to submit an assignment when due, you will be marked absent for that week.

• Homework assignments (25%)

In order for the student to receive credit, homework assignments must be completed and submitted on the dates indicated on the course schedule (below). You will receive full credit for completed exercises that demonstrate attention to detail and effort even if there are small or occasional errors. The homework allows you to practice your writing and review the grammatical structures you learn each week.

• Two individual presentations (20%)

The presentations allow you to apply the writing and speaking skills that you are acquiring. The instructor will provide prompts based on which you will write essay responses and present them in Vietnamese appropriate for an introductory course. You must record yourself reading the presentation, upload the video to YouTube, make the video "Unlisted" by using the drop-down menu on the upload page so that the instructor can view it, publish it, add a written transcript in the form of subtitles (edit uploaded videos by accessing YouTube's Creator Studio; use the "Transcribe and auto-sync" option to add subtitles from a Word document to the video), and submit the link to the video to the instructor via Canvas by the due date listed on the course calendar. Presentations will be evaluated according to the rubric available on Canvas.

Two scripted dialogs (20%)

The scripted dialogs allow you to collaborate with classmates to write and perform conversations in Vietnamese appropriate for an introductory course. The instructor will provide prompts based on the content presented in the course. You will be assigned a different classmate with whom to work for each dialog. You must record yourselves performing the dialog using Zoom video conferencing, upload the video to YouTube, make the video "Unlisted" by using the drop-down menu on the upload page so that the instructor can view it, publish it, add a written transcript in the form of subtitles (edit uploaded videos by accessing YouTube's Creator Studio; use the "Transcribe and auto-sync" option to add subtitles from a Word document to the video), and submit the link to the video to the instructor via Canvas by the due date listed on the course schedule. Please note that the student recording the dialog must be using a desktop or laptop computer. Dialogs will be evaluated according to the rubric available on Canvas.

Essay (15%)

Students write a short essay (900-1200 words) in Vietnamese. The instructor will provide prompts as well as an evaluation rubric at the beginning of the semester.

Oral interview (15%)

The instructor will provide a list of questions representative of the grammatical structures, vocabulary, and cultural content presented throughout the semester. The oral interview will be based on questions selected from the list. You will be scheduled for a Zoom video conference to conduct the interview with the instructor. Interviews will be recorded by the instructor and evaluated according to the rubric available on Canvas.

- c. Attendance and Participation policy: Regular attendance and participation is an important way for you to be successful in this course. General Education Requirements

a. This course meets GE requirement C.2 Introduction to the Humanities. The learning goals in General Education as outlined in <u>UPS 411.201</u> are listed in bold face below, followed by the specific learning goals for the course.

Cultivate intellectual reasoning skills, expand the capacity for creative imagination, develop their reasonable moral sensibilities, and increase the capacity for sensitive engagement through studying great works of human imagination and reason (which are to be primarily—although not exclusively—written texts and literature).

Each chapter features the practices, products, and ways of life of the Vietnamese, allowing for the study of socio-cultural topics at a level appropriate to intermediate learners. Such topics include ancestor worship [Week 2], food [Week 4], traditional customs [Week 6], country life [Week 8], folksongs [Week 11], and arts and crafts [Week 13]. Students learn to develop their ideas about these topics and communicate them through homework assignments, quizzes, exams, and essays.

Assessment: This goal is assessed through exams, essays, homework assignments, and presentations.

Understand how the humanities have contributed to the development of culture, including the comparative study of the humanities in diverse cultures.

Each chapter features an important theme of Vietnamese culture such as family and ancestor worshipping (Week 2), traditional customs (Week 6), cuisine (Week 4), folk culture (Week 11), the role of countryside (Week 8), and handicrafts (Week 13). These topics are presented and discussed in the Vietnamese and other contexts, allowing students to develop comparative analysis, intercultural skills, and critical reflection.

Assessment: This goal is assessed through exams, essays, homework assignments, and presentations.

Understand how the humanities have sought to provide answers to complex problems facing humanity, including the relationship of the self to culture and the natural world, the nature of moral and legal obligations, and the meaning and purpose of human existence.

The chapters and lessons frame the topics listed above as responses to, and reflections of, challenges faced by the Vietnamese people; in particular how globalization and modernization are reshaping important Vietnamese traditions. These challenges relate to areas including but not limited to the economy (Weeks 13 and 14), the family unit (Weeks 2 and 3), the rural and industrialization (Weeks 8 and 9), oral traditions (Weeks 11 and 12), and food and lifestyles (Weeks 4 and 5).

Assessment: This goal is assessed through exams, essays, homework assignments, and presentations.

b. VIET 204 meets the GE Writing Requirement. According to <u>UPS 411.201</u>, writing assignments in GE courses "shall involve the organization and expression of complex data or ideas and careful and timely evaluations of writing so that deficiencies are identified and suggestions for improvement and/or for means of remediation are offered." The writing prompts included in homework assignments and exams are designed to satisfy this requirement. Evaluation of student writing will consider the organization, quality, and clarity of the ideas presented as well

as the level of Vietnamese proficiency demonstrated. The instructor will use rubrics (available on Canvas) to provide prompt, specific feedback and suggestions for improvement on all assignments.

c. <u>Minimum Grade Requirements:</u> A grade of D (1.0) or higher is required to meet this General Education requirement. A grade of D- (0.7) or below will not satisfy this General Education Requirement.
